Zillertaler Krapfen, Gerstelsuppe, bread from a bakery, Schweinsbraten mit Sauerkraut

Places you must see:

Zillertal, Bergiselschanze, one of the castles nearby, the Innsbruck city center; further away: Rattenberg old city, Achensee

Essential phrases in your local language:

- "Passt scho." - "It's okay."
- "Servus" or "Seas" - informal "Hello" and "Goodbye" in Austria (Don't say this to professors!)
- "Grüß Gott!" - formal "Hello"
- "Tschau" - informal "Goodbye" (Don't say this to professors!) "Auf Wiedersehen!" - formal "Goodbye"

Cost of living:

Housing costs: In Innsbruck, comparable to Reykjavík; outside of Innsbruck, usually cheaper.

The best thing about studying at your institution:

The many things that you can do nearby. Cost of living compared to Iceland: a bit cheaper than in Reykjavík.
